
#### 3.1 School CP statistics (May 2024) -

- The above scores achieved in the Reflective Project are indicative of the candidates' strong independent research skills.



## 3.4 Percent points distribution – all subjects





- Comparisons year on year to shape practice. COVID was a bit of a disruptor, so last year, used 2019 as the closest comparison (as this was the year we returned to fully traditional grade boundaries/ weightings), but at the stage where school can revert to reflecting on yearly trends as things have stabilised.
- Main point scores: The average point score is secure. Students with 38 plus are looking at selective, students with 40 plus are highly selective. Limited variance at the top end (40 plus points).
- Mean Core Points for EE & TOK taken by all DP students. Max is 3 points, so pushing averages up in this part reflects a whole phase effort to make sure students are able to secure bonus points where possible (EE and TOK).

There is a rise in cohort numbers, and standards need to remain the same.

- To analyse Chinese A results. No students scored a level 7 (across ESF).
- When correlating students' scores with their English scores (the course is the same), they score more highly in English. Investigate reasons for that, i.e. in touch with IB.
- Lower attainment in English Lit compared to English Lang Lit. Will make sure the course selection here is the best fit for students.

#### 3.8 Continued approach to reflection and forward planning

- Heads of the department have been provided with data (class, teacher, subject, level, component, cohort, ESF, etc) and share their analysis with us, with identified strategies for improvement.
- This process is used to inform departmental strategic planning in line with the secondary strategic plan.
- Mid-year checkpoints for progress are set.
- Students are tracked at the coordinator level, heads of department level and teacher level with pastoral support throughout.

## 3.9 Approach to reflection and forward planning

- Finalising consistency in curriculum planning documentation
- Working closely with Y11s on course selection (i.e. language selection, SSST provision, suitable Math choices). Building a broader support network.
- Unpacking Chinese A and group 6 results trends
- Supporting larger cohorts (i.e. EE advisors)

#### 4. Confirmation of minutes of the last meeting

The minutes were confirmed and approved without amendment.

#### 5. Matter arising

#### 6. Principal's Report (HB)

- 6.1 Number on roll: A record enrolment. 992 in the Primary School and 1142 in the Secondary School = **2134** students College-wide.
- 6.2 <u>Staffing issues:</u> All new teachers arrived on time for the start of school. This year is a record-low attrition rate for faculty, with only three new in Primary and six in Secondary half of those new hires for the additional student numbers. Support staff and EA positions are also mostly filled.

#### 6.3 Premises Issues:

- 6.3.1 Summer works projects were completed as planned. The final major campus restroom upgrade was finished in the PAC. The proposal for the Sports Hall renovation is still being reviewed by ESF and the College but is expected to begin in May 2025.
- 6.3.2 Sodexo, our new food service provider, is up and running. Business Manager, Anney Chan is in regular contact with the canteen manager and the Sodexo representative to address issues as they arise.

#### 6.4 Action items:

- Seek approval of "Authorization of Delegation (The Principal has delegated signing authority to the Business Manager for the following matters, seeking the Council's approval of this delegation):
- 1) Approval of any orders for goods and services up to the value of HK\$200,000, provided such orders do not exceed the School Council-approved budget.
- 2) Approval of purchase requisitions raised by the Head of Primary, Head of Secondary, and Vice-Principal of Learning Technologies.
- 3) Approval of any single purchase with a value exceeding HK\$10,000 that not going to call competitive quotations (Non-competitive Bidding application) in case of a narrow market with limited potential sources to meet the requirements of a number of quotations.

The council approved all of the above three items.

#### 6.5 Results from the RCHK College Council Survey 2023-24:

RC used the ESF school council survey online system to conduct the survey. The report was generated on 23 August 2024 and shared with the council members before the meeting. It was reviewed during the meeting.

#### 7. Business Manager's Report (ASC)

## 7.1 <u>P&L Report as of 31/07/2024</u>

#### 7.1.1 Incomes

- Tuition fee income is significantly above the forecast. Enrollment has consistently exceeded 2,093 students compared to a budget based on 2,082 students.
- Interest income is very strong. Admission fees are also above the forecast.
- Rental income is slightly behind expectations but has returned to pre-COVID levels.

#### 7.1.2 Expenditures

Staff expenditures (73% of total expenses) are within the forecast, as are most other expenses. However, five budget lines exceed the budget:

- General office expenditures
- Training and development
- Utilities (water and electricity)
- Communications
- Teaching materials due to various school events (musicals, murals, sports events, etc.)

#### 7.1.3 Interim result

- As of July 2024, there is a surplus of HKD 15M, indicating an exceptionally good year.


#### 7.2 BUDGET 2024/2025

- Budget done on 2,120 students (compared to 2,082 students this year). The actual number of students on board now is 2134.

#### 7.3 NMR UPDATE

- 62 NMR applications have been received so far (48 for Y1 and 14 for Y2 and above)
- 44 total payments already (17 from ESF KGs)
- 2 offers declined
- 12 unaccepted and refund
- 4 under review
- Amount to Total HKD 17,700,000

- 9.5 Sai Sha Kindergarten have been announced to be opened between Wu Kai Sha and Sai Kung in 2026. It can accommodate 300 students. Students who attend Sai Sha will be guaranteed a place at ESF renaissance College. The existing kindergarten in Tung Chung will cease operations at that point and will move to Sai Sha.
